### 2 Ploughing Championship

- At this years Ploughing ICBF joined with the National Cattle Breeding Centre, Munster Cattle Breeding, Progressive Genetic and TEAGASC in a stand focused in cattle breeding. The stand was one of the busiest on the whole site.
- Over the three days a large number of farmers visited the stand and had a chance to discuss their cattle breeding requirements.
- ICBF, with the help of sponsorship from the Aberdeen Angus herd book, joined with the Farmers Journal to run a competition. Entrants were asked to estimate the weight of a bull on St Valentines day 2006. The bull was in a pen on the Farmers Journal stand and will be performance tested at Tully prior to going into the Tully sale on 4<sup>th</sup> March 2006. The prize is the sale price of the bull. The bull is an Angus, Carbery Baron, bred by Keith Vickery of Rosscarbery. It was selected because it has some of the highest values for an Angus for the Beef Production Sub Index and the Weaned Calf Sub Index.

### 5 Tully

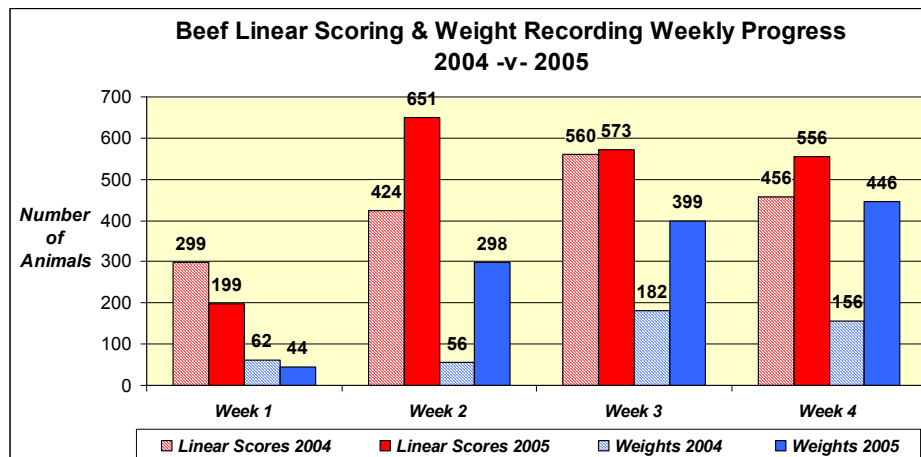
- Applications have been sent to breeders for the November intake into Tully. The numbers of herds which received letters and the number of eligible animals in these herds are as follows:

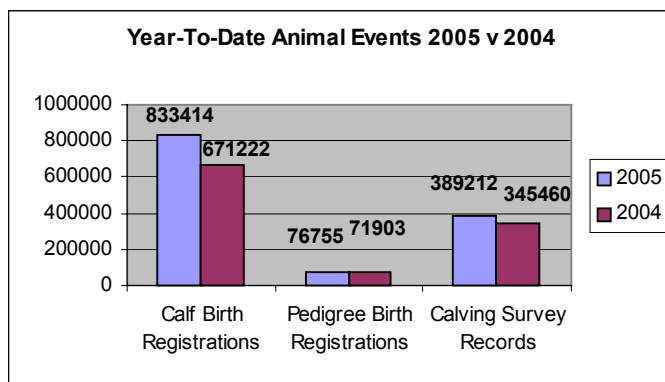
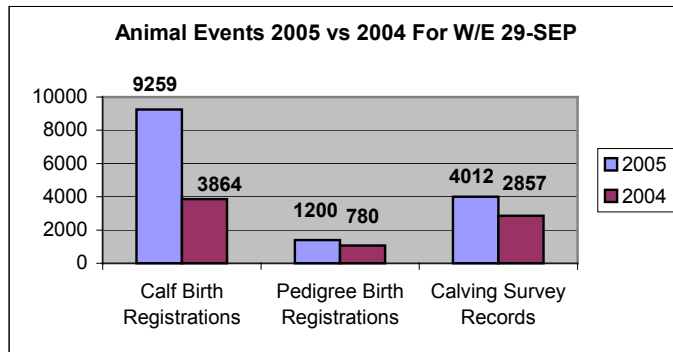
### EDIY Stand at Ploughing;

## 8 Database Update

- 21 new herds added to the database last week.
- 5,106 Teagasc ICBF permission forms have now been returned by Teagasc clients.
- Breeding charts are continuing to be returned at a very good rate. Good progress is being made in the building of the expected calving/fertility report that will go back out to farmers
- Having live access to the database at the ploughing this week proved to be very popular with farmers, many of whom had reports printed for them that they had mislaid, or had problem animals sorted out there and then.
- The keying of the missing sire reports is continuing. Next week should see the end of the keying of these reports.
- Work on some of the back-end functions (billing, reporting, etc) is continuing.
- Next week will see two intensive days of planning for a database upgrade that will be happening over the next six weeks or so. The current version of the software is no longer being supported by Oracle, hence the reason for the upgrade. The upgrade will consume quite an amount of resources over the coming weeks.
